




International student guide 2021/22

Prepare to join us



Ready to welcome and support you

Some of you will be preparing to travel to Dundee and join us on campus for Semester 1, whilst others plan to study online for some or maybe even all of Semester 1, and then come to Dundee. One thing remains the same for everyone – whether you will be in Dundee or start studying remotely from home, we are ready to welcome and support you. This guide aims to answer most of your questions about starting your student life at Dundee.

Immigration and visa information


If you need to apply for a student visa, please check the UK government website before making your visa application.

The earliest you can apply for a Student Visa is 3 months before you start your course if you are already in the UK, or 6 months before your course start date if you are outside the UK (depending when you receive your CAS).

Even if you will start studying with us online and won't arrive in Dundee until later, you must obtain your Admissions Letter before you will be able to matriculate (register) online. You will also need your Admissions Letter and Confirmation of Acceptance of Studies (CAS) to apply for your visa before you travel to Dundee.

To get these you will need to:

- Hold an unconditional offer of entry to your chosen programme and have firmly accepted this offer.
- → Complete the Previous Study in the UK form.
- → Pay your tuition fee advance payment. The more you pay, the more it shows your commitment to study with us which can improve the strength of your visa application. Once you have made your payment, please upload proof of payment (card transaction receipt, copy of bank statement showing transaction, or copy of completed bank transfer) to My Applications on eVision. If you are funded by an official financial sponsor (Government, international agency, multi-national company, British Council or Education institution) please upload your sponsor letter to MyApplications on eVision.
- If you have been allocated University accommodation, please pay the advanced rental payment to secure your accommodation.
- → Submit a scanned copy of your passport, degree certificate or final transcript, and your English language certificate (or relevant equivalent).
- When requested, log in to MyApplications on eVision, check all the information we hold for you is accurate and submit your pre-CAS checklist.
- → Complete the Study on Campus form in eVision to tell us when you plan to travel to Dundee (we will let you know when it's available for you).

Depending on when you plan to arrive, we will send you an Admissions Letter with the CAS Statement, which includes the CAS number and all the relevant information we have sent to UKVI. All of our sponsor licence details are in this statement which you will need to copy into your visa application.

Your CAS number is also only valid for one application, so if your visa is refused, please let us know as you may be able to apply again and a new CAS will be considered.

If you will start studying remotely and plan to arrive in Dundee much later, we will delay issuing your CAS until nearer your planned travel time (but still giving you enough time to apply for your visa). Before we will issue a CAS to anyone who has started studying remotely, your engagement with your online classes will be reviewed. If you do not engage regularly with your online classes we will not be able to issue you with a CAS to arrive in Dundee later in the academic year.

Tuition fees

For courses starting in Semester 1, you will receive an email towards the end of Week 1 asking you to pay any remaining tuition fees. You can either pay the full amount by credit card or bank transfer, or set up a payment plan from a UK bank account. Please be aware that we will not be able to accept cash payments.

Bringing family

If you are studying an undergraduate programme you can't bring your family with you to the UK. However, you can bring dependants to the UK if you are studying a postgraduate course of at least 12 months or you are studying a course of at least six months and you are sponsored by your Government.



International Engagement Team

Matriculation

Matriculation is where you officially register as a student to allow you to attend classes and access facilities such as the Library and My Dundee. You'll be asked to matriculate online at the start of every academic year while you are a student.

When you are ready to matriculate we will ask you to upload a photo for your Student ID card and also to complete a pre-matriculation task in eVision. You will matriculate online in eVision and full instructions will be given to you.

University-arranged accommodation

We offer self-catering furnished rooms across four sites. All self-contained single bedrooms have their own shower and toilet and a shared kitchen and dining area. Bicycle storage, wired and wifi internet connections, laundry facilities and utility bills are inclusive of rent. You are guaranteed University accommodation for your first year of study on condition you apply by the deadline.

Once you've firmly accepted your conditional or unconditional course offer as your first choice, you will receive an email to access the online application form and apply for a room. Once allocated a room, you will receive your room offer. This will have a reply date so don't miss it! An advanced rental payment will secure your booking, and if you don't meet your University offer conditions, we will refund your money. We are based within The Enquiry Centre.

Private accommodation

Dundee has lots of accommodation, so don't rush into making a decision. Think about where you want to live, who you will live with and what you can afford to pay in rent each month. You can book a hotel or a bed and breakfast giving you time to decide where you want to live in city.

If you decide to rent privately DUSA has a legal housing advisor to help you with any problems you might have and a website full of information on how to go about finding a private rent flat in Dundee. Their housing advisor can provide you with lease checks, your rights and responsibilities as a tenant, help with inventory and deposits, repair issues and other questions on housing matters.

Health

Bring a 3 month supply of any prescription medicines (check your medicine is legal in the UK) and any necessary medical records or letter from your current doctor. Bring a copy of your prescription for glasses or contact lenses (this lets you replace them easily if you break or lose them).

Money

Bring a recent bank statement, your UK national insurance number (if you have one) and any insurance policies. It is advisable to bring approximately £200 cash and up to £500 on a prepaid Visa/MasterCard for immediate expenses (Travellers cheques are difficult to cash so are best avoided). Use the International Student Calculator to help plan your budget while living in Dundee. Important costs to consider before you come to Dundee: travel to the UK, accommodation (including the cost of utilities such as gas and electricity bills), food, day-to-day living costs and travel expenses.

Personal security

Take common sense precautions; keep your money in an inside pocket or bag, make sure you cannot see your purse, and do not leave bags unattended. Take special care of your passport and personal documents, it can be very tiring travelling so remember to keep them close to you. Keep important documents in your hand luggage along with your passport, your original qualification certificates and your offer letter.

We strongly advise you not to travel with large amounts of cash!

Checklist of documents to bring to Dundee

It is very important you bring original documents and not photocopies. If you are a Student visa holder then please bring:

- → Qualification certificates
- → English Language Certificate
- Documents listed on your Certificate of Acceptance of Studies (CAS)
- → our CAS statement
- CAS statement changes (Receipt or UKVI screenshot printouts of payments you have made to the University after your CAS was issued)
- → Passport with 90 day vignette sticker
- → Confirmation of your accommodation address in Dundee
- → Extra passport photos
- → Financial sponsor letter (if you have one)
- → Biometric Residence Permit BRP (Student) if you have received this
- → Identity documents which can include birth certificate or marriage certificate

Tip!

When planning your journey do not travel through Dublin as your visa will not be stamped and validated on entering the UK, therefore you would be required to travel out of the country to enter through a UK airport.





Travelling to Scotland

The UK and Scottish Governments have introduced a 'traffic light' system with all countries and territories classed as either red, amber or green in relation to the restrictions in place for people arriving into the UK. Since the list of countries on Scotland's and the UK's green, amber and red lists can change at short notice, it is very important that you check the Scottish Government and UK Government webpages for the most up-to-date information to fully understand what you must do before you travel.

Managed quarantine and self-isolation after arriving in the UK

New, existing and returning international students travelling to undertake on-campus learning in 21/22 from a home country that is on the UK/Scottish governments' Red List for coronavirus will need to book a managed quarantine package for arrival in the UK. The University will refund the £2285 cost once you have arrived in Dundee and matriculated for study:

Once you have booked your flight and know your arrival time you should book a taxi online before you leave home. When booking, please make sure that you give the exact address and postcode of the accommodation you are going to (not the main University postcode). You can find out more, including links to online taxi booking solutions and how to claim your refund, on our website:

Travellers entering the UK must submit a passenger locator form online 48 hours before the date of their travel unless they are from a country on the list of exemptions.

Unless you fall within an exemption you will not be allowed to leave the place you are staying in for the first 10 days you are in Scotland except in very limited situations.

If you have firmly accepted University-arranged accommodation you will self-isolate for 10 days in your allocated accommodation. You will be supported by the Residences Support team and other Student Services teams who will communicate with you by email and Microsoft Teams (for video calls).

Government rules on self-isolation for amber arrivals have changed again recently to allow people arriving from the USA and amber EU countries who have had both vaccinations in one of those countries to be exempt from having to self-isolate. 2 On arrival in Dundee



BRP card

Your Vignette in your passport lasts 90 days to allow time for those who need to self isolate.

Your letter from the UKVI confirms which Post Office to collect your BRP card from. To collect your BRP card take your passport and letter to the Post Office (30 Whitehall Street, DDI 4AF) within 90 days of arrival. If they do not have your BRP or if you have any difficulties collecting your card, email internationalsupport@dundee.ac.uk

The University are registered as an Alternative Collection Location for BRP's. If you made your visa application from 2 August 2021 you would have had the option to select our ACL code 3HE297, thus allowing you to collect your BRP from the Enquiry Centre on Campus when it is safe to do so.

Registering with the police

Normally nationals of some countries are required to register with the police within 10 days of arrival. If you are required to register, the condition of entry will be endorsed in your passport, BRP or your Home Office letter of confirmation of entry.

The Immigration Compliance Team will contact you to let you know of any Police Registration events that will take place on campus.

Doctor and dentist registration

The National Health Service (NHS) is free, with no charges for prescription medications in Scotland. As an international student you will have paid a health surcharge as part of your visa application which will give you access to the same services as a UK resident. Choose any GP (doctor's) practice within Dundee and register there. Choose a dentist that takes on NHS patients, otherwise you will be charged as a private patient and this can be very expensive.

UK bank account

You can only open a UK bank account once you have received your student ID. Banks open from around 09:30 to 17:00 Monday to Friday and have 24-hour automatic cash machines. To open a bank account you complete an application, some are online applications and provide the following documents:

- → Passport
- Introductory Letter to the Bank (found in eVision under 'student resources')
- → Funds to deposit
- → Proof of your local address in the UK

Life in Dundee

The weather in Scotland can be unpredictable, in spring (March to May) the average temperature is between 3 and 6 degrees and our summer (June to August) ranges from 14 to 22 degrees. In autumn (September to November) we have bright days as the colourful leaves fall but it can be windy and wet, and the temperatures in winter (December to February can reach freezing, sometimes with snow!

Key fact Dundee is the sunniest city in Scotland! We have 17 hours of daylight in the summer but in winter we only have 7 hours of daylight!

Clothing

Please bring warm clothing if you can, but there are plenty shops to buy a warm clothes in Dundee.

Transport

Dundee is a small city and you can walk almost everywhere. The campus is located just a short walk from the city centre. Our centrally located train and bus station provide connections to all major cities across the UK. Our local bus companies Stagecoach and Explore Dundee provide various ticket options for students.

Full-time students can apply for a railcard that allows you to save 1/3 on rail travel throughout the UK, you can pick up the form from The Enquiry Centre.

Dundee city centre has many shops, mobile phone stores, restaurants and supermarkets including a Chinese store and various Halal shops. The Overgate Shopping Centre near campus has cafes, bars and restaurants, and opens 7 days a week. Leisure and entertainment attractions include Dundee Rep Theatre, Dundee Contemporary Arts, V&A Dundee, McManus Galleries, Verdant Works, Mills Observatory and the Botanic Garden. Dundee has many parks, green spaces and a beautiful beach at Broughty Ferry.

Immigration regulations

Even during these difficult Covid-19 times there are Home Office rules you must comply with and our friendly Immigration Compliance Team are always on hand to help keep you up to date.

When you first arrive the team will contact you to verify your visa and passport details electronically to complete your matriculation process. At this point we will also provide you with details about how you engage with your studies. Once you start your studies you must continue to engage with your modules, as expected of all students, and this can currently be online by logging into your classes, lectures, tutorials and coursework submissions, or may be physically in labs or face to face meetings (whenever possible) with academic staff. The team will be in touch with you if engagement with your studies becomes a problem, to help direct you to support and ensure that your immigration status is not at risk.

During these changing times it is also very important that you keep your details updated on eVision so we can keep in touch with you. This is not only a requirement under the terms of your visa but ensures that we can keep you up to date with any changes to immigration rules and University information.

'Check-In' to your classes using an App

This year we have changed the way we capture student attendance. Bluetooth beacons are now situated across our campuses in timetabled teaching rooms to allow you to 'Checkin' to classes using an app on your phone. The University is using the SEAtS mobile attendance capture app for Check-In, and this is available for iOS and Android devices from the App Store and Google Play.

Simply search for the SEAtS Mobile app and follow the standard instructions to download. Once you've downloaded the SEAtS Mobile app, login using your University account details.

This simple and easy to use app will replace paper registers and give you access to a mobile dashboard with a traffic light system signalling if your attendance is at risk. Insight into this type of data will help all our students manage their own attendance and engagement and allow Academic Schools and Student Services to reach out to students so that the right levels of academic and pastoral support can be given.



Personal safety

The Security Centre covers the campus 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The campus is covered by CCTV and has Emergency Assistance points, which provide instant 2-way communications with security and immediately dispatches help upon activation. The Police Scotland service are very supportive and promote key messages which centre around six main safety areas: Home & Property, Online Safety, Party Safety, Identity Safety, Water Safety and Illicit Trade.

Key Fact

Some students are being targeted by criminals on WeChat and mobile phone pretending to be from organisations (such as the UK Home Office). They may hold information and demand money claiming if you don't pay there will be consequences (for example deportation or cancelling your visa). The Home Office or any other organisation would not contact students in this way. Please do not give or send any callers personal information or payment. Instead, tell them you will report this fraud to the police and hang up.

English for International Students

English for International Students (EIS) offers support for students whose first language is not English.

We develop your English language and academic skills with our 10-week programme. It's free and runs in both semesters. A placement test is required to determine the level of support and starts in Week 2 of each semester. Choose one or two classes from the following subject areas; Academic writing, Academic speaking and Grammar review, among others.

Specialist English Support Module

You can choose to attend a tailored English support module for specific degree programmes, including students in the School of Business. This is a credit-bearing module so will appear on your degree transcript.

English Language Clinic offers online appointments to support international students who have questions about anything to do with Academic English including the structure of coursework, exam preparation, presentations, or just need some general language advice. We do not offer a proof reading service.

Library Services

The Library and Learning Centre offers facilities and services across four sites on the city campus, Ninewells and Kirkcaldy. The Main Library is a spacious complex with comprehensive facilities including high speed wireless, an internal cafe, and study facilities to support group, interactive and individual modes. During exams the Main Library is usually open 24 hours a day, and in semesters it is usually open from 07:30 to 02:30.

The Main Library is open 365 days a year, with minimum hours of 09:00 to midnight including the weekends and holiday periods. Also the Ninewells Library is available to all students 24/7/365 using a pre-registered student card for access. Professional staff are on hand to provide guidance. You can download the Library mobile phone app, as well as a range of systems including the VLE and reading list provision. Due to current distancing rules, a desk booking system has been implemented in the Main Library.

Hours of work during studies

The UKVI have set restrictions on working hours for Student visa holders. Most students with a visa are eligible to work a maximum of 20 hours per week during semester and full-time during holidays. This also includes voluntary (unpaid) work. Check your visa/BRP for conditions of work. Placements and internships will only be eligible if it is an integral and assessed part of your course. Those on Visitor visas are not eligible to work. See IAS Guide:

Minimum wage and contracts of employment

The national minimum wage is aimed at providing employers with minimum standards and fairness in the work place. The Government has set standard rates of a minimum pay per hour almost all workers are entitled to, depending on age. It doesn't matter how small an employer is, they still have to pay the correct minimum wage.

When offered any kind of employment, you can check the gov.uk website to ensure you will earning the minimum wage of above

Obtaining a National Insurance number

When you start work you will need a National Insurance (NI) number. You do not need this number to start work but you must apply as soon as you receive the offer of a job. You will need to make an appointment with the Jobcentre Plus by telephoning the central number 0800 141 2075 / 2438.

The new Post Study Work (Graduate Route) Visa

The new immigration route will allow eligible students at higher education providers, studying any subject, to work for two years after completing their course, three years for PhD students

The key features of the route are:

- → It will be open to international students who have successfully completed a course of study at undergraduate (RQF 6) level or above at a Higher Education Provider with a track record of compliance, and who have a valid and extant student visa at the time of application;
- → The application process will be simple. There will be an application fee and applicants will pay the Immigration Health Surcharge;
- Individuals will be able to work, or look for work in any sector, at any level;
- → Individuals will be able to switch into the skilled work route if they meet the requirements.
